During the discussions, members looked at various themes that are likely to inform the report, which will be published in 2019 - the ILO's Centenary year - including new forms of work; the impact on work of the shifts in global demographics; digitalization and its implications; lifelong learning; inclusivity and gender equality; the measurement of work and human well-being; and attaining sustainable development.

More market power for Kenya's farmers

More and more farmers in some of the poorest areas of southern and central Kenya are working their land and selling their produce as a group, based on agreements with buyers. This way of farming gives poor farmers more negotiating and market power, and helps them better plan what and how much to grow. They also have a clear idea of their produce's price and best time to sell it. Since 2015, some 15,000 farmers have been joining forces to form groups and practice collective marketing. Each group has 15-30 farmers, and a few farmers' groups constitute a community-based organization (CBO), which is normally registered with the county government.

Harmonised Unemployment Rates (HURs), OECD - Updated: May 2018

The OECD unemployment rate remained stable at 5.4% in March 2018. Across the OECD area, 34 million people were unemployed, 1.4 million more than in April 2008, but 15.1 million below the January 2013 peak.

The unemployment rate was also stable (at 8.5%) in the euro area in March and was stable or fell in all euro area economies. The largest declines (by 0.2 percentage point) were in the Netherlands (to 3.9%) and Portugal (to 7.4%).

'To Double Farm Incomes, India Must Get People Off Farms'

Fan, 56, winner of the 2017 Chinese Nobel for management and a PhD in applied economics from Minnesota university in the US, in an interview with IndiaSpend, discusses the paradox of hunger amid economic growth in India, doubling farmers' incomes in a time of climate change and challenges of urbanisation. India has an ideological problem with farmers moving out of agriculture, he said. "I think some of them must go out [of the sector], including some of the well-to-do farmers. [This is what] we have learnt from China, Vietnam and other countries in east Asia."
